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## Health and Healing

Last fall I received a referral for a parishioner who had undergone an angioplasty. This lady is a widow and lives alone. I visited the client on the day of referral and was welcomed into her home. Following an assessment, I found her BP elevated, no edemas and chest clear. She was slightly short of breath, had an intermittent dry cough, some discomfort in the knees and her incision was intact. Two days later, she came to the BP clinic at the church. Her BP was still elevated, some wheezing in the chest and increased shortness of breath was present. Upon my advice, a friend took her to the ER in the hospital, where chest X-rays were taken. Based on the X-ray results, her out-of-town family MD ordered a CT scan.

At my next home visit, the client had seen her family MD and was waiting for the CT results. At this visit she was very tired, very short of breath and had bilateral wheezes on auscultation. With her permission, I phoned her daughter. But, I was unable to reach her. As it was evening, I went with the client to the ER in the hospital.

The attending physician had the CT results on hand when he saw the client. The client wanted me to stay with her. So, I was present when she was told that the CT scan result showed lung cancer. This was most difficult news. I supported and prayed with the client. A friend brought the client home. The client informed her children of the diagnosis and wanted to find a family doctor in town. With her permission I contacted a physician who is also the palliative care MD for our area. He accepted her as a patient.

During this initial period of her diagnosis I visited, prayed and supported her often. It took a while for her to tell her friends of her diagnosis. Her friends in town were mainly friends from the Catholic Women's League and from her small prayer group. The client was known as a well-liked, happy, cheerful lady, blessed with a strong faith. Several friends took her to appointments and radiation treatments, prepared her meals and visited and prayed for her. Our Parish Priest, Father Dave, visited often and she received Holy Communion on a regular basis. I presented the client with a prayer shawl from our health committee. She treasured her prayer shawl and it was of great comfort to her.

The client's son came to live with her and cared for his mother around the clock. He was the primary caregiver, assisted by nurses from CCAC. Unfortunately, the cancer had metastasized and her condition worsened rapidly. Throughout all difficulties the client remained cheerful and strong in her faith. I continued to visit the client often, prayed with her, gave support to her son and advised and advocated when needed.

Because of the strong support of her family and her church community she was able to remain in her home. Her family is very grateful for the support given by our priest, friends and the parish nurse. The client passed away on a Sunday. Many in our parish will remember her as a lady of deep faith, courage and kindness. She taught and loved us as we loved her and she brought us closer as a parish community.

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## HONORING EVELYN WILKINSON

In the spring of 2005, Evelyn Wilkinson invited me to hear Gail Brimbecom tell her experience, of setting up the first pilot project in Parish Nursing Ministries' at Westminster United Church in Whitby. That day, I sensed a call to this ministry and was hired as the Parish Nurse at Aurora United Church in 2006. It was Evelyn's spark that ignited the fire within 12 dedicated members of Aurora United Church who formed the Health cabinet that fall. We were saddened by the loss Evelyn on March 15, 2006, as she succumbed to her battle with cancer.

During her illness, Evelyn received a prayer shawl from Gail Brimbecom, this meant a great deal to her. The Prayer Shawl Ministry at Aurora United Church grew out of the whole

concept of wellness; connecting body, mind and spirit. The prayer shawl carries prayers and love from the weaver to the recipient, bringing peace and comfort to those who suffer illness and loss.

On May 2, 2010, Health Cabinet members, friends and family gathered in remembrance and honour of Evelyn Wilkinson's vision. *The Evelyn Wilkinson Parish Nursing Centre* was dedicated, acknowledging the seeds Evelyn so lovingly planted in our midst.

Evelyn's spirit lives on in our Parish Nursing Ministry today.



# Revisiting our Mandate – A Progress Report

The Freeform Team



InterChurch Health Ministries Canada (ICHM) has recently become involved in a World Vision program called FreeForm which helps non-profit ministries such as ICHM to maximize their potential. The goal is to increase ICHM's capacity in several areas: strategic, financial, human resources, and leadership planning. The 18 month FreeForm program began in April 2010 with the first of three residential retreats – the next two being in October 2010, and April 2011. ICHM's Freeform Team consists of Karen Marks, Chantelle Browne, Tom Doherty and Vreny Mathis.

The first retreat, besides some emphasis on team building and leadership, focused heavily on ICHM's core mandate. The mandate provides the basis for all further planning. It consists of three areas:

- Core Values
- Mission Statement
- Vision Statement

At the April residential, the FreeForm team drafted a new mandate for ICHM's future. The team then sought further input from ICHM's staff and the broader ICHM community. We thank all who participated in this effort. The outcomes of both the staff retreat and ICHM questionnaire have greatly helped in formulating profound, lasting statements.

At the September Board Meeting, the Freeform team reported on all the work to date, asked the Board for additional input, and to endorse a final wording. So far, the board has reached consensus on ICHM's core values.

**Core Values**, according to Jim Collin in *Built To Last*: "are the organization's essential and enduring tenets – a small set of timeless guiding principles that require no external justification". ICHM's Board members are pleased to present the newly approved core values.



## InterChurch Health Ministries Canada Core Values

### ICHM values:

1. healing ministries following Christ's example
2. wholistic health for all, encompassing the physical, psychosocial and spiritual
3. continued learning through education and support
4. health and healing ministries that are congregationally driven, theologically based and mission focused
5. the inclusion of a parish nurse within a congregation's ministry
6. collaborative partnerships to promote healthy communities

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## ICHM Partner Celebrates 177 Years of Ministry in Madoc, Ontario

## Thriving in a Changing World

A report from the 24<sup>th</sup> Annual Westberg Parish Nurse Symposium

Gail Brimbecom and Karen Marks attended the 24<sup>th</sup> Annual Westberg Parish Nurse Symposium from September 16 to 19 in St. Charles, MO along with several other Canadians. The conference, presented by the *International Parish Nurse Resource Center* located in St. Louis, MO, began with the World Forum for Parish Nursing on Thursday evening. The symposium theme was "Thriving in a Changing World," with the goal of equipping parish nurses with strategies and tools to enhance wholistic ministries. Karen co-presented a poster (with Laura Rydholme, RN, MSN) titled, "InterChurch Health Ministries Canada: Parish Nursing Ministry to Seniors Captured in DIARY Notes," which documented the work of parish nurses receiving funding through the Waterloo Wellington LHIN *Ageing at Home* strategy. Some of the workshops Karen and Gail attended were focused on research, getting published and spiritual practices. Keynote speakers included Judy Siegle, participant in the 1996 and 2000 Paralympic teams in wheelchair racing and Joan Borysenko, PhD, Medical Scientist, Psychologist, Spiritual Director and former director of Harvard's first Mind/Body Clinic. Joan is the author of 14 books on healing, spirituality and resilience. Joan's lecture focused on burnout, how to recognize it and what to do about it. Not all the learning happens in educational sessions as there was much to learn from the hundreds of parish nurses who attended the seminar. Contacts were made with nurses who are involved in ways of doing ministry and education that ICHM would like to develop, such as models for rural parish nursing and distance education. Attending this conference allows ICHM to build relationships with IPNRC and parish nurses across North America and the world.
